Kids Need Kiwanis!

THE ELIMINATE PROJECT UPDATE

I am sure that you would agree that the effects of maternal and neonatal tetanus (MNT) are horrifying. Newborn babies who contract the disease and don't have access to health care are almost always assured a sudden death. In addition, the babies suffer excruciating pain that prevents even the comfort of a mother's touch.

Although the cure for tetanus was discovered in 1924, one baby dies every 15 minutes from this highly preventable disease. As a matter of fact, this deadly disease takes the lives of nearly 31,000 innocent babies and a significant number of women each year. Given this, the question you may ask is, "Can I make a difference?" The answer, of course, is, "Yes." If you have not made a pledge, make a pledge, and you will make a difference.

Since 2010, our Kiwanis family and UNICEF have worked as partners to eliminate this dreadful disease from the face of the Earth. Our fundraising efforts have raised \$110,000,000 in cash and pledges.

To date, \$86,803,320 of this amount is in cash. This is 78% of Kiwanis International's established goal. Hopefully, as a Kiwanian, you have given your fair-share of the established goal. This would mean a minimum donation of \$474.

Since my last update to you, Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) has eliminated MNT. This means that we have 12 countries still depending on Kiwanians to finish what we started. We have given them hope. Let's not disappoint them. There is, indeed, a sense of urgency. The end of 2020 is just around the corner, and I know the Georgia District is looking forward to being in the Winners' Circle.

To date, the Georgia District has raised \$2,279,829 in cash and pledges toward our \$3.8Million goal. Of our 150 clubs, only 52 clubs have made pledges. 40 of the 52 clubs have pledged to be \$100K or Model Clubs. 132 clubs have made contributions at some level (88%), and 18 clubs have not participated in the Campaign. Now back to the question, "Can I make a difference?" If you have not already made your fair-share contribution, consider making a pledge of \$1.00 per day for the next year in support of the mothers and babies in the 12 remaining countries who are depending on Kiwanis

Finally, let me offer a special Kiwanis thank you to all our Georgia Kiwanians and friends who are going to assure that the Great Georgia District of Kiwanis proudly declares victory when the Campaign ends.

Buck-N-Ear Program - Auditory Verbal Center Inc. What would you do if your child was born deaf or hard of hearing?

Deaf & hard of hearing people need not be relegated to a world of silence. The Auditory Verbal Center (AVC) is a not-for-profit organization in Atlanta and Macon, and now offers teletherapy for those families who cannot make the drive to one of the locations. AVC teaches children who

are mild to profoundly deaf to lis-

ten and to speak without the use of sign 1 a n guage lip or reading.

E11a w a s born with p r o found

hearing loss but with her cochlear implants she is able play the guitar with her Dad. Ella also takes Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu classes with her Dad and can hear the instructor without missing a beat. Even though Ella is deaf, cochlear implants and AV therapy allow her to listen and talk to all her friends in her mainstream kindergarten class. Ella loves singing and will often perform the songs she has learned in school. She also loves telling stories about her dogs and all the mischief they get into at home. She loves music and danc-

ing around in her many big tutus! Hearing-impairment is the most common disability in newborns, affecting one in every 200

babies born each year in the Unit-

ed States. In addition, various illnesses, ear infections and exposures after birth can cause hearing loss, making the total number of hearing-impaired children even greater.

AVC is not a school but a center. Once a child has access to sound through hearing aids or a cochlear implant AVC works with the child and family to put meaning to the sound. Auditory Verbal therapy progresses through four steps of auditory skill development -- detection, discrimination, identification, and comprehension -- thus following the hierarchy that a normal hearing child would follow. When a child graduates from the program they are age appropriate expressively and receptively to their hearing peers mainstreamed into pre-K or kindergarten with normal hearing children needing no additional assistance for their hearing impair-

The Auditory-Verbal Center is a Georgia District approved and recommended project. Please check with your club and see if your club has participated in all District projects including the Buck-n-ear program. This program counts for young children priority one projects.



Other Committee Reports

Question: How do you make a secure password?

Answer:

Usually when you are asked to create a password, they want you to make a secure password. Secure passwords are hard to break by brute force (simply guessing) or by dictionary attacks where they guess words in the dictionary. In addition, it is strongly suggested you use different passwords for different sites so if your email provider has a breach and your username and password stolen, then they will not automatically have access to your bank account for instance.

The rules are usually that the password must contain upper case letters, lowercase letters, numbers and special characters. Sometimes all four are required or three of the four. Also, the length normally must be eight or 12 characters. This stops people

from using the most common passwords like password and 12345678 which actually are used a majority of the time shown by

If you are like many people, your comment now is how do I come up with one that I can remember? I might make a 1Wr1t3@L0t for my password if I had to use one to submit my article to the newspaper. Now to show you how I came up with it and how easy it would be for me to remember. Notice it is 10 characters long, so if rule is the password has to be at least eight it is ok. I have included upper case letters, lower case letters, numbers and special characters.

First, I came up with a phrase related to the site that is at least eight characters long. I chose I write a lot. I then made that one word. Iwritealot. Notice for someone just seeing it is already getting garbled, but we I get IeaWCagaae. That already looks like

Next, I change letter a to @ and that will be easy to remember but someone looking at probably not see how fits. Iwrite@lot. Then I change I to 1 and o to 0 (letter to number) and have it further mixed but still clear to us. 1wr1t3@10t is now the password. Now I have letters and numbers and special characters.

Next, I will change the first letters of words to sentences. It now looks like 1Wr1t3@L0t. Now I have met all the rules and made a secure password I can remem-

Another way to start this is come up with an eight-word phrase and then use the first letters. I enjoyed attending Winthrop College and graduating as an eagle. That phrase is true about my college life and so I could remember it. Taking the first letters

hard to guess or break but easy for me to remember. I then do all the items from above and end up with I3@WC@@3 which looks totally confusing to anyone but me since l know the phrase and conversion.

This should make it easier for you to develop secure passwords you can remember.


