• -1 in 4 youth will suffer some type of child abuse or maltreatment, including sexual abuse

- -85% of child abuse victims **NEVER** report their abuse
- -Abuse is usually at the hands of known acquaintances and family members NOT strangers
- -More than 90% of abusers are people children know, love and trust

Our organization's life blood is our youth and our mantra is "Serving the children and families of the world." I share the above statistics to impress on each of us how to better appreciate and understand our responsibilities to the youth in our charge whether that be during SLPs, community activities, overnight events, etc.

Youth Protection means learn-

ing how to recognize untoward behaviors from youth to youth or adult to youth and the tools you may need to use as a means of intervention. Those that look to do harm to our youth have a name, "Predator." They are highly skilled at what they do. My job is to provide the · information necessary for you to protect yourself, the club and Kiwanis International from any form of liability during those activities we engage in with the youth. I ask all clubs in our District to invite me to one of your meetings via Zoom or other social media platforms.

Before the meetings, I ask each club member to review three of the six modules, on Kiwanis.org/ youthprotection site: Policies and

Procedures, Background Checks

and YP Training. These will be the three I will focus on for the discussion. The YP Training has six modules that provide a clearer understanding of how a predator establishes his/her relationships with a youth in preparation forthe abuse. Folks there are certain realities that are unpleasant. This is one of them. I understand that, however, I would ask that you consider the trauma some of our youth have experienced that may have been avoided if only ... and you fill in the rest. 

A Kiwanis Christmas

It was a Saturday night in early December 2018 when I got an email from my friend Kay, the president of the Lawrenceville Kiwanis club. In her email, she stated that the local DFACS organization had added about 50 kids at the last minute to their foster kids Christmas gift buying service project. She was reaching out to anyone that could help since her club had already done so much and had completed the earlier list and she didn't feel right asking her club again. It was also such short notice since the gifts had to be received by next Thursday to make sure the foster kids had them by Christmas. It seemed impossible and deflating.

I called Kay after reading the email. She had one last option, like a true Kiwanian, she was going to dip into her own savings and use credit cards to do as much as she could, but even then there was not enough time to get everything bought, wrapped, and delivered. After a long sigh, Kay almost broke down and said that "these foster kids just will not have Christmas this year"..... Something came over me and I replied "That ain't gonna hap-

pen".

After hanging up the phone and Kay emailing the list, I went

to work, I texted my friend Megan, the president of the Suwanee Kiwanis club and she signed up her club for a half dozen kids, the I reached out to my own club, North Gwinnett, and they responded like champions....Not only did they sign up for kids, they were reaching out to their friends and by Sunday night, every foster child on the list had been assigned. It was amazing to see the response.

At the next Kiwanis meeting, my explorer was so packed with gifts, we had to take 2 more cars to get all the presents home. However, come Thursday, the day that we were supposed to get the presents to Lawrenceville city hall, I had forgotten to tell everyone that they needed to deliver them. We had over 30 foster kid Christmas's spread across Gwinnett County

and only hours to get them to the collection site. The word got out about our dilemma and Officer Bradley from Gwinnett County Police asked if they could help. That morning, over two dozen patrol cars spread across Gwinnett County and picked up presents from peoples homes and delivered them in time so that every foster child had a Christmas that year!

Since then, North Gwinnett Kiwanis has partnered with Wellroot to help provide Christmas for over 250 foster children. This past year, even with the COVID making things a bit more challenging, Kiwanians have responded. When there was 5 kids who did not have their presents received at the collection site after the last night of collections, I contacted the clubs officers, Past President Steve




Our Kiwanis volunteers assembled the gift cards with a note and candy cane for the children, and the cards and notebooks were delivered to each school and the deserving children. We thank

Hello everyone! Last time we talked about the Foundation and how it can help the clubs in the District reach for projects they might not could do alone. This time, I'd like to tell you about ways that the funds that the Foundation draws from are replenished-because if we keep granting requests but don't have any funds coming back in, well, we wouldn't be providing grants for very long.

There are a number of ways that you can help to bring funds into the Foundation. Number one, you already do. Each club contributes \$ 7.00 per member as part of the District projects. Governor George Elkins very generously increased this amount this year from \$ 5.00 per member and we are very grateful to him for that. Lt. Governors who have 100% participation with all the clubs in their Division receive the Georgia District Kiwanis Foundation Lt. Governor plaque, acknowledging their support of the Foundation and their service to children in the State of Georgia.

Anyone may make a donation to the Foundation at any time. As a 501(c)3 organization, your contributions are tax deductible (always consult with your own tax consultant). Additionally, gifts may be made as part of your estate plan. Any of these contributions may be designated by the giver for a particular use, if desired, and the Foundation will honor that request.

One of the most popular ways to contribute to the Foundation is the Henry C. Heinz award, made through a donation of \$1000 from an individual, Club, Division, or any other group of Kiwanians to the Georgia District Kiwanis Foundation. This award is named for Henry C. Heinz, one of the first Kiwanians in Georgia and one of the first involved in Kiwanis International. He was president of Kiwanis International in 1927-1928 and the first International officer from Georgia. While he never served as Governor of the Georgia District, he was instrumental in the formation of the Kiwanis International Foundation, serving as the first president in 1941. The first Key Club was formed during his year as International President.

This award was created in 2002 to honor those individuals who have exhibited outstanding dedication and commitment to helping children. It can also be given in memory of someone and presented to the recipient's family. The recipient is honored with the Henry C. Heinz Award Medallion, a lapel pin, and a certificate acknowledging the achievement.

THE ELIMINATE PROJECT UPDATE

As we closeout this year, we cannot forget the complex environment that we find ourselves. Our campaign to eliminate maternal and neonatal tetanus (MNT) worldwide continues, as our World struggles with the COVID-19 pandemic. With these two crises facing us, we can't lose hope as Kiwanians. Remember, "Serving the Children of the World" is still our Motto.

Although COVID-19 has caused us to delay some of our fundraising activities, now, more than ever, we are determined to finish the mission we have begun. 12 countries are still depending on the Georgia District and Kiwanis International to eliminate tetanus from their homelands. They are still waiting for us to fulfill our pledges. Only our funding can insure the end of this dreadful disease and insure the beginning of better health for millions of mothers and their babies. So, Georgia District, we still have unfinished work to do.

At the beginning of The Campaign, we made a pledge to raise \$3,799,250 as our portion of this fight. The total pledge made by Kiwanis International was \$110,000,000. As of 31 October 2020, Kiwanis International had gifts and pledges totaling \$106,293,070. This is 96.6% of its established goal. At the same time, the Georgia District made a pledge to raise \$3,799,250. To date, the Georgia District has gifts and pledges totaling \$2,303,373. This means the District still has \$1,495,877 yet to raise. There are some who will say we cannot do this. I hope you will stand with me and say we can!

The question you may ask is, "How do we make this happen?" Of course, there are many answers to this question. From the outset, I suggested that we use a comprehensive fundraising approach and leverage our members, our clubs, outside organizations and activities, and corporations, and to organize special fundraising events within each club. Key to this is individual commitments. If you have not made an individual pledge to The Campaign, it is not too late. With our current membership, the "fair share" for us to fulfill our pledge is \$281.00 per member. There are still clubs within the District that have not made contributions to The Campaign. As your Coordinator, I am available to assist in any way you may desire.

As always, let me give you a quick update on where we stand with The Campaign: (1) As already indicated (above), we still have 12 countries yet to eliminate MNT: 8 of these countries are in Africa. Three are in the Middle East, and one is in Asian Pacific. (2) The Service Leadership Programs of the Georgia District have made contributions totaling \$140,020. Of this amount, \$112,162 was made by the Key Clubs. (3) Since my last report, we have an additional Major Gift Pledge (\$25,000). This brings the number of Major Gifts Donors to 6.

Finally, let me thank each of you who have been so generous in your giving and to ask that you continue your generosity until we can celebrate that we have fulfilled our mission. I want to see a World where a baby is no longer dying every 15 minutes from tetanus. I know you want this too.



Mr. Dale Dyer turned 101 on December 8, 2020!



Mr. Dale Dyer, a member of the Kiwanis Club of Blue Ridge, Georgia, turns 101 on December 8, 2020. He has been Kiwanian since 1948 and remains an active member. He is a model for our Club in giving back to the community and in living life well.

Born in Clearwater, Kansas in 1919, he was a student athlete, class president, sang in the glee club and was active in his church. He attended Kansas State University, but his studies were interrupted when he got his ROTC 2nd Lieutenant commission and his orders to report to Fort Riley on June 1, 1942. He trained as a pilot and got his wings to fly a B24 bomber. He flew 26 missions over Germany, bringing his entire crew home safely. He married in June and was honorably discharged in September of 1945. He then completed college with a degree in Mechanical Engineering.

Mr. and Mrs. Dyer moved to Blue Ridge, GA for his 20 year career with the Pontiac International Harvester Dealership. Following his success there, he and a friend started a real estate business where he achieved another 30 years of success. He finally retired at the age of 75. Since his retirement, he has authored a book about the history of Fannin County, writes a weekly newspaper article and works with the Fannin County Historical Museum. He has been given a key to the city of Blue Ridge, been honored multiple times by the local VFW and received the Distinguished Service Medal for his military efforts.

He plays golf with friends, enjoys his church family and loves his children and grandchildren. His son, Larry Dyer, is also a member of the Kiwanis Club of Blue Ridge.

This disease causes an infant to have extreme pain and sensitivity to light and touch, but is easily treated with a series of vaccines.
