ONE LIFE LOST. ONE FLAG FLOWN.

KIWANIS CLUB OF MARIETTA COMMEMORATES 20TH ANNIVERSARY OF 9/11 AT THE FIELD OF FLAGS

For almost 25 years, the Kiwanis Club of Marietta (KCOM) has been known throughout the community for its signature Flag Project. Club members deploy over 1,700 three-by-five foot American flags around the town square, at businesses large and small, and at residences throughout the community on six patriotic holidays each year. Proceeds from the project fund the club's ten scholarships that are awarded annually to local students.

Following the terrorist attack on September 11, 2001, then-president Devan Seabaugh and the late Glenn Graham, Flag Committee Chair, saw an opportunity to expand the club's flag-related activities. They conceived of a "field of flags" to honor those who perished on that fateful day and convinced the club to make their vision a reality.

After months of intensive planning and preparation, KCOM members led a respectful community procession on September 10, 2003, carrying almost 3,000 flags to Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield field where they were installed in precise rows on a sacred battlefield. The following day, September 11th, the club held its regular meeting outdoors against the stunning backdrop of thousands of American flags on ten-foot poles waving in the breeze, and a tradition was born. The club committed to recreating this stunning visual tribute to 9/11 victims every five years.

HERE ARE MY GOALS:

Open a minimum of seven new Kiwanis Clubs with at least 15-20 members from that community.

Start our Club Coach program to counsel the under charter strength Clubs and assist other existing Clubs that want their assistance. We have 50 certified coaches that will be assisting all over our state that has already started in September.

Each Club strive to increase

membership by one member at the end of this Kiwanis year.

To have 100% of our Clubs participate in contributing the requested \$24 per member, per Club in the District Projects. In doing so, this makes you apart of Kiwanis International assisting everyone in Georgia and beyond.

Every Club buy or sell their allotment of Raffle Tickets and not just send them back to the District office when received. This raffle helps keep the District from needing a fee increase for the next Kiwanis year. The amount of profit from the raffle tickets sold this year represented the need not to raise fees \$3 per member.

For Clubs to educate themselves on budgeting for the year by including the annual KI fee, Division Agreement, District Projects so you will have the money when the invoice is received.

Each Club file their monthly secretary report BEFORE the 10th of the following month.

Each Club should have a member assigned to their Student Leadership Programs that have a approved Kiwanis International background check.

Have the best Governor's Rally EVER in each Division with high member attendance including SLP's.

Clubs nominate a candidate for the Governor's Leadership Medallion and SLP leaders for the Mel Hayden Student Leadership Medallion.

Have the best in-person Mid-Year

Training Conference and District Convention in Macon.

Ensure that every member has received the Youth Protection Guidelines to protect the youth we serve.

Constantly look for new methods of keeping our members informed by utilizing more electronic means of getting the Georgia Kiwanian to everyone without spending \$2500-\$3000 to mail one monthly issue.

After two years without the District Art and Music Showcase, we will have one in Gainesville in the winter of 2022.

Let each of us dedicate this coming year to get back in a safe manner to serve our communities better by reaching the new needs caused by the pandemic. Clubs had record years in fundraising last year and every Club should be thinking outside the box to create more opportunities to raise money and give back to the needy. NEW DUES STRUCTURE

Starting October 1, 2021 there will be a new dues structure for when the club gains new members. Now, KI will have graduated dues like the Georgia has had, reducing the cost to the Club depending on which month you sign the new member. REMEMBER, come the following October you will be charged \$107 per member for all who are on your roster.

The District is suggesting that each Club charge enough money for new members in the Club dues, in order to have the \$107 banked for the following year. Many Clubs do not budget properly during the year and when the new Kiwanis year comes, their Administration account doesn't have the funds to pay the annual Kiwanis International and Georgia District dues.



I'm Rick Townsend and I am looking forward to serving as the Club Growth Chair for our great District this year! As you know, the position of Club Growth Chair isn't a one-person job and I am fortunate to have Frank Felker and CR Phillips serving as the Vice-Chairs. Additional members of the Club Growth Team are Governor Byron Mullican, Immediate Past- Governor George Elkins, and Governor-Elect Darryl Gumz.

Governor Byron Mullican has asked us to concentrate on the following goals:

- Continue to counsel the existing under charter-strength clubs to educate and encourage them to recruit new members.
- Host a Council meeting on club strengthening in each Division and have the district team speak at these meetings.
- Increase membership by one member in each club.

Governor Byron has setout attainable goals for all of us to meet. I know quite a few clubs have lost members due to Covid or other reasons, but we will try to work with all the clubs that would like help from fellow Kiwanians. The Georgia District has 49 Kiwanis International certified Club Coaches plus Past Georgia District Governors and Past Lt. Governors Association members ready to coach clubs with a need. At this time, 27 Coaches have been assigned to coach existing clubs. We are also fortunate to have a strong group of Lt. Governors as part of our team who are willing to help us identify clubs who may need assistance strengthening their club.

Please look for the monthly District E-Newsletter that is distributed through social media and email for more articles on club growth and strengthening in addition to success stories. There are two strategies your club could implement immediately to help with club growth. First, set goals for your club regarding club growth. Either adopt Governor Mullican's goal of at least one member for the year or if you think you can add more, increase it based on your club's norms. Second, make sure you have a membership committee formed to monitor the growth of your club. One last thought for the day: What doesn't get emphasized, doesn't get accomplished.

HAVE FUN WITH INTERCLUB VISITS

Interclub Chairman Kiwanis Club of Swainsboro

Interclub visits are fun and informative and can lead to lasting friendships. They also give you an opportunity to see what other clubs are doing and allows you to adopt those activities that can be used in your club. In addition, Kiwanis International is encouraging clubs close to newly Chartered Clubs to assist the new club to get them conducting business the "Kiwanis Way!" Some Divisions have some members join the new club and serve in leadership rolls the first year to make a smooth transition into Kiwanis International.

2021-2022 Interclub Policy:

- 1. It only requires one member from a club to count as an **"official"** interclub visit.
- 2. Clubs will receive a banner patch IF they complete the interclub challenge. To complete the interclub challenge a club must make a minimum of eight interclub visits. Seven of these visits must be with clubs in their Division AND one club out of your Division. The seven visits must be to separate clubs. In a small division, multiple visits to a club will count as long as you visit every club within your division. SLPs, Training conferences, and Conventions do not count for the interclub patch.
- 3. Patches will also be given to the top 10 clubs who have the most visits and to the top 10 clubs who have the highest miles traveled at the end of the Kiwanis year (Sept 30, 2022). SLPs, Training conferences, and Conventions do count for the Top 10 interclub patches.
- 4. Remember to report all interclubs on your monthly report and to me to assure you have credit for completing the challenge. You MUST notify me in addition to entering the visits on the Secretary dashboard.

Auditory-Verbal Center's "Buck-n-ear" Project Chair Kiwanis Club of Brookhaven/Chamblee

The "Buck-n-Ear" Project was founded in 1984 and is considered a Priority One Signature Project and Georgia District Sponsored Project.

For over 40 years, we have provided quality Auditory-Verbal Therapy and hearing healthcare services to children and adults who are deaf or hard of hearing. Through Auditory-Verbal Therapy, we are developing the listening pathways in a child's brain, laying the foundation for a lifetime of listening and speaking without the need for sign language or lip reading. Our specialists offer family-centered speech therapy services, consultations, and referrals through the Auditory-Verbal Program. We also provide intervention directly in Spanish with a bilingual therapist.

Our caseload has been steadily increasing as we continue to reach more kids across the state. To accommodate our growing caseload we just hired another bilingual auditory-verbal therapist and is looking to hire two more! Earlier this spring we moved our Macon location into a bigger facility, and we are also moving our Atlanta location into a bigger facility in Nov.

The window of opportunity to learn spoken language after birth is very short, which is why we didn't stop serving our clients due to COVID. We temporarily transitioned 100% of our clients to Teletherapy so they could continue to receive the services they needed and not fall behind.

Despite our challenges during the COVID pandemic, in 2020, we have:

- Served 177 clients in our therapy program
- Served low-income and uninsured families, which is 65% of our caseload
- Enrolled 59 new clients
- Provided \$54,000 in scholarships for therapy
- Loaned out 31 Teletherapy kits and/or Speakers
- Graduated 12 clients

Your contributions is a gift that keeps on giving as you are giving these kids the chance to live in a world with listening and spoken language and a life without limits.

As we closeout another Administrative Year in the Georgia District, I would like to take this opportunity to thank each club that made a contribution to the Kiwanis Children's Fund during the year. Indeed, you should be proud, as your gifts totaled \$25, 902. 102 clubs in the District stepped up to the plate and represented the Georgia District in your characteristically outstanding way. 68% of our clubs participated in the Annual Giving Program.

In addition to the club giving, individuals in the Georgia District gave \$10,085. This brought the total giving (to date) for the Georgia District to \$35,987. In the "per-member challenge," the Georgia District was at \$7.16 per member and was number 12 in the international challenge. The Indiana District was Number 1, with a per- member giving of \$15.42. This year (to date) the Kiwanis Children's Fund has raised \$956,242, through the District Giving Program. On behalf of the Kiwanis Children's, I thank you.

As always, the Kiwanis Children's **Fund continues to help Kiwanians** change kid's lives. Its vision is to extend the Kiwanis impact and to hold fast to the core values it has established for itself. These values are Stewardship, Transparency, Responsiveness, Legacy, Integrity, and Trust. Along with these values, the Kiwanis Children's Fund believes accountability has to be "front and center" in its daily operation. After all, the gifts they receive are our hope for children's lives. As a side note, Charity Navigator gave the Kiwanis Children's Fund a 100% rating in accountability and transparency during its last rating. So, let us make the Kiwanis Children's Fund one of the charitable organizations that is on our annual giving list. Only through our gifts can the Kiwanis Children's Fund continue to make Kiwanis International the premier service organization in the world.

Recently, I have had questions from Kiwanians about what Kiwanis is doing as it relates to lodine Deficiency Disorder (IDD). To these questions, I have responded that the Kiwanis Children's Fund continues to make the elimination of IDD a priority. As a matter of fact, the KCF had to assist in some recent efforts in Sudan and Cambodia to combat IDD in these two countries. Likewise, we are steadfast as we continue to support the efforts to eliminate maternal and neonatal tetanus in the 12 remaining countries where this dreadful disease is still killing mothers and babies.

As you probably already know, we again had a very success Annual Raffle Drawing at our District Convention, in August. After we paid off the winner of the drawing and other associated expenses, the District realized a profit of over \$16,000. The decision was made to donate these funds to the Kiwanis Children's Fund, in support of The Eliminate Project. At the same time, the Georgia District Foundation Board of Trustees voted to match this donation. As a result of these actions, over \$32,000 will be donated from the Georgia District to help us fulfill our pledge to this Campaign. For this great display of generosity, I want to personally thank all who had a role in making this action a reality. Truly, this is a real "Kiwanis Moment" on display.

Finally, let me challenge each of our clubs and each of us as individuals to double our financial support to the Kiwanis Children's Fund over what we did during the last Administrative Year. This is our Foundation, and, through it, "We Serve the Children of the World." I am thanking you in advance for your support!

NOVEMBER TBD @ 7PM:





WATT THOUGHTS: HOW DO I HIDE EMAIL ADDRESSES IN EMAILS?

When you send of receive emails sometimes, they have a long list of email addresses on them. This can be a problem several ways.

First is the person reading the email sees all the addresses and depending on how their email provider shows the email it may mean scrolling overt them to find the message. That is a distraction, and you will lose some readers from reading your email and some may get more interested in seeing names on list and forget what they were doing.

Second is that this is a cybersecurity vulnerability. The email may well get forwarded to people you do not know and may have bad intentions when they see a list of addresses like this. They are threat actors, and there are lots of ways the email can end up in their hands, just realize it can and does happen.

Once the threat actor gets the list, they have a real valuable list to go phishing or spamming with or to sell to other threat actors for better money than just a list. The list you just sent shows a number of addresses that are related. Sending to them and identifying as them on

name on email means more likely these people will fall for a phishing or spam email. In addition, it may be a list of names and email addresses within an organization and now using the same approach they have a way to use social engineering and get the keys to the kingdom (actual the passwords to the organization) which then allows them to hack the organization and steal stuff. To do that they can send an email to people on that list appearing to be from high ups or IT and get passwords if people are not alert.

My suggestion is when you are sending an email to about five or more people instead of listing them on TO or CCC lines, use the BCC line. In some cases, it is always there and some cases there is an option for BCC that will have line appear. Put everyone's name and email in the BCC.

What does that cause? All that will appear as addresses on each email received is the address and name sent to and the name and email address of this one sender. Often you do have to put something in TO also and I always just list my name and email address.

There is one more bonus to doing this. If recipients hit Reply All instead of reply (a number of email systems default to reply all, which I dislike the default this way) the reply only goes to the sender, not everyone like if you had them all in TO or CCC.

This will help make a friendlier online world.

Continued from page 1: **FIELD OF FLAGS**

The 2021 Field of Flags marked the 20th anniversary of the terrorist attacks, and was recognized as one of the largest memorials in the nation. This was the fifth time that KCOM and members of the community came together for this solemn remembrance that was also designated as a Division 15 initiative. The two-week event formally kicked off on Saturday, September 4th, with a mile-long processional of nearly 3,000 flags. Led by the Atlanta Pipe Band, hundreds of club members, Boy Scouts, ROTC students, elected officials, and individuals of all ages carried flags from a local church to the battlefield and installed them in the meadow. This year, thirteen additional flags flying at half-staff were added to the Field of Flags to represent the service members killed recently in the evacuation of Afghanistan.

Early on the bright, clear morning of September 11th, the club held a community-wide memorial service at the Field of Flags. Heather Graham Tamburello, who was only a child when her father, the late Glenn Graham, helped to make the first Field of Flags a reality, sang the national anthem. Club president, Edith Boy, commented on the magnitude of the loss of life as she looked out across the thousands of flags in the field.

The featured speaker at the memorial was Captain James D'Avolio, a retiree from the New York Fire Department. In his emotional remarks, D'Avolio described the sights and sounds as he rushed to Ground Zero to search through the rubble for signs of life. While he lost many personal friends and colleagues that day, he was also part of the team that rescued the

last person found alive in the debris.

As the service progressed, KCOM members and community volunteers took turns reading aloud the names of victims of the attacks, stopping four times to ring a bell to observe the exact moment, twenty years ago, when each of the hijacked airplanes crashed.

After two weeks of hosting thousands of visitors, including survivors of the attacks and family members of victims, club members removed the flags from the battlefield on September 18th. The flags were taken to a local church for disposition. Some were picked up by their sponsors, while others were prepared for mailing. Still others were donated to the club's ongoing Flag Project, where they will be deployed again on Veteran's Day. The opportunity to sponsor a flag or donate to the GoFundMe page to help to defray approximately \$50,000 in event costs is still available at http://www. 911fieldofflags.com/sponsor.

Marietta Kiwanians Frank Mims, Jamie Vann, and Michelle Cooper-Kelly served as co-chairs for the event and were ably assisted by twenty-two club members who addressed a myriad of logistical and financial challenges. GeoSurvey owner and Kiwanian Trent Turk and his staff used state-of-the-art surveying equipment to mark the nine-acre site into grids and identify the placement of each and every flag. Sam Kelly (retired), another longtime member of the club, arranged for his former employer, Cobb Electric Membership Corporation (EMC), to provide nighttime lighting. Club photographer, Johnny Walker, captured hundreds

of images that were shared by local media and on social media. Other corporate sponsors included C. W. Matthews Contracting and Withers Tool, Die, & Manufacturing.

Looking out over the Field of Flags, former club president Devan Seabaugh, an EMT company executive and state representative, described a personal connection to the memorial he first envisioned in 2003. He said, "When I look out over the Field of Flags, I think of all the lives lost, including EMTs, police officers, and firefighters who willingly sacrificed their lives to save others. This field reminds us that freedom comes at a price."
