DAVID SIMMONS

It was an extreme pleasure to have received the nomination from the Cordele Kiwanis Club for the office of Vice-Governor starting the 2022-2023 Kiwanis administrative year. I am honored to have been chosen for this prestigious position. As both clubs and members continue to overcome the COVID pandemic, I am encouraged by the potential that Kiwanis can continue to make in the Georgia District. During this year, as I have attended all but one of our Governor's Division Rallies, I am inspired by the difference that local Kiwanis clubs are making in their respective communities.

My tenure with Kiwanis started on April 5, 1990 when I became a member of the Cordele Kiwanis Club. I was elected to the Cordele club's Board of Directors in 1991 and have served on the Board on multiple occasions, from 1991 until 1995 ,and since 2009. I was privileged to serve as Club President during the 1993-1994 Kiwanis year and have served as the club's secretary since 2011.

In 1997, I was elected by what was then Division 3 to become Lt. Governor. I served in that position during 1998-1999 Kiwanis year. Following my service to the Georgia District Board, I became a Kiwanis International Certified Instructor and began training clubs with Club Leadership Education in 2000. continue to serve in this capacity. Along the way, I have been honored to have been chosen by a variety of Georgia District Governors to be a part of their leadership team. I have served as the following chair for the Georgia District: Club Administration Chair (2004-2006), Education and Training Chair (2006-2007), Training Conference Chair (2007-2008, 2013-2014, 2020-2021, and 2021-2022), and International Convention Chair (2009-2010). In 2013, I was appointed to the Georgia District Foundation Board. I remained on the Board until 2016 and served as Board President in 2014-2015. In 2020, I was asked to serve on the Georgia District Finance Committee and continue to serve on that committee.

On September 1, 2019, I became a Charter Member of the Kiwanis Club of Warner Robins, which

INTERCLUB TIPS

Interclub Chairman Kiwanis Club of Swainsboro

Let's take a quick look at the numbers:

85 Clubs have done at least one interclub - Since there were 142 clubs at the end of December, that means 60% of the clubs are participating in interclubs. 24 Clubs are close to eligible for an Interclub Patch - That is 17% of all clubs and 28% of participating clubs. We have a grand total of 1157 interclub visits for a total travel distance of 58,307 miles. That is 1/4th of the way to the moon. 549 visits (47%) are within our home Division.

Remember:

Remember to report all interclubs on your monthly report and to the Interclub Chair to assure you have credit for completing the challenge. You MUST notify the Chair in addition to entering the visits on the Secretary dashboard. This policy presents a challenge, but it is very significant to satisfying the interclub challenge. Alexia does give me an aggregate report, but that doesn't give enough information to verify that a club has met all the criteria for the challenge. The District officers and board members have access to the interclub data but I do not have that access. I hope we can work around that issue. We currently have about 4 clubs that send a report to me. At least send it when you have completed the challenge so I can check it.

Next Kiwanis Year:

The incoming Governor will give direction to the Interclub Policy for 2022-2023. If you have suggestions, please let me know and I will pass the information to Darryl. I have had some interesting suggestions already, so let me know. I always seem to get asked "what do I do with what I learned?" That is simple - share what you have learned with your club, either through the Club President, your club Interclub Chair, the club board, or at a club meeting. Share, share, share!



As your representative to Kiwanis Children's Fund (KCF), it is my hope to be your Ambassador and at the same time be a resource for all matters relating to your Foundation, <u>The Kiwanis</u> <u>Children's Fund</u>. For this article, I would like to make <u>my focus on</u> <u>the Club Grant Program.</u>

Looking back over the history of the Kiwanis Children's Fund, one finds an organization that has been on the frontlines making its impact for local hometowns and for crisis and disasters around the world. It has been Kiwanis International's fundraising arm, developing resources that serve the children of the world. It is important for you to know, as a Club, that the Kiwanis Children's Fund is a potential funding partner for you.

If you apply for a club grant, it requires thoughtful preparation and thorough attention to the program's criteria. The keys to

programs criteria. The keys to preparing a successful grant application can be found in the Foundation's, "A Guide to Club Grants", at (https://www.kiwanis. org/docs/default-source/childrens-fund-documents/grants/aguide-to-clubs-grants.

In terms of eligibility and requirements, projects mu

requirements, projects must support activities addressing at least one of the following Children's Fund cause areas: (1) health, education, or youth leadership development. (2) The project must be Kiwanis-led. This means at least 50% of the work must be performed by Kiwanians or Kiwanis family members. (3) The project must fill a need within your community. (4) The project must include programming that recurs at least once per year. (5) It must receive at least 25% of total funding from your club. (6) Your project must require no more than 40% of total funding from the Kiwanis Children's Fund. (7) You must have at least one non-Kiwanis funding partner. Finally, (8), you must spend the grant

money within 12 months of when the grant was awarded.

The following are important date for your consideration. For October 1 funding decisions, you must submit your Letter of Inquiry any time before June 1, and if approved, submit your full application by August 1. For March 1 funding decisions, submit your Letter of Inquiry any time before November 1, and if approved, submit your full application by January 1. For August 1 funding decisions, send your Letter of Inquiry any time before April 1, and if approved, submit the full application by June 1.

Know that ideal projects are (1) widely familiar, (2) sustainable, (3) recurring, (4) capable of being duplicated, (5) children-and Community-focused, (6) high-impact, (7) membership-focused, (8) network-building, and (9) unique.


RESILIENCE

Today we were privileged to host a huge Terrific Kids ceremony and party for the fifth graders who will be leaving for middle school in just a few days. As we prepared to share the final Terrific Kids certificates and then party, one of the event leaders asked the kids what they were taking with them to middle school. The very first answer was "responsibility". Others then shared "kindness", "a positive attitude", "respect", and other great character traits. Too good to be true? No, I was there. I was the next to speak. I thought how these kids knew just what to say - just what they thought we wanted to hear. Were they coached? Yes, but let's use the correct term: They have been taught and led to understand the value of these character traits. I was delighted at the responses that made my remarks so easy: Keep these precious virtues, and you will be successful, not only in middle school, but throughout your life.

As the bad news piles up daily, from the economy to international crises, these kids are grabbing onto something bigger than the messes their leaders are creating. When I talked with the kids, played with bubble wands, and spoke solemn words of encouragement, theirs was a hopeful outlook. This neighborhood school historically has had few bright spots, but that did not hold for this day. They had a glimpse of hope and promise that they are collectively laying claim to. Our kids are back. They are more resilient than we ever give them credit for, and we could learn a lot just by listening to what they have to say at the end of their elementary school days in 2022.

I said our kids are back. They are back from the horrors visited upon them by COVID 19 over the past years. We asked all of our Silver Pen participants this year to focus on the effects of COVID 19 on them, their families and friends, and their school. Faculty and Administration repeatedly shared how the students were uncharacteristically engaged in this subject, producing some amazing documentaries of life with COVID. Our reading of the finalists' papers confirmed what everyone was telling us. The challenges were perhaps more difficult than we had imagined. The hardships created by isolation and home schooling were beyond any reports we had heard. Friendships were destroyed; Family stresses changed the dynamic among families and friends; Technology was often impossible to use; and there was palpable "worry, fear, anxiety, and depression." Yes, these are the kid's written words. I choked back tears at reading the magnitude of what they have endured. Yet, they know and state that these circumstances were temporary. They saw positive results from COVID, like closer family ties and more opportunities to do things together as family. They realized that everyone was taking stock of the way things were in this horrific life pause. But the most heartening responses from the kids were that they see life after COVID and are excited to get on with it. They can say aloud the words that some things will never be the same, yet embrace the promise of better health and a better world. "COVID 19 has had an enormous impact on my life and helped make me who I am today." That student goes on to say, "But I know one thing for sure: It made our family relationship stronger." Our kids are resilient, perhaps more so than we are. They are willing to let go of the things that they now see were not that important. They are holding onto their values and stepping up to make theirs a better world. Fellow Kiwanians, I believe we have been challenged by our kids to go and do likewise!



THE 2022 "SILVER PEN" AWARD PRESENTED BY THE KIWANIS CLUB OF MARIETTA GOLDEN K TO THREE OUTSTANDING FOURTH GRADE STUDENTS IN COBB COUNTY GA

The Silver Pen Award, a national program, was presented by the K iwanis Club of Marietta Golden K in May of 2022. This year Cobb County, GA was represented by three outstanding 4th grade students from Rocky Mount, Acworth and Tritt Elementary Schools. The awards were presented to the classrooms of each school via a school wide media center "live" broadcast ceremony.

Jim Perry, Past President of the Kiwanis Club of Marietta Golden K made the presentations and described what was different about the Silver Pen awards this year:

Thank you to everyone who helped and encouraged, as we had another great year with our Silver Pen Program. This year we chose what was perhaps a difficult topic for the fourth grade kids: HOW DID COVID 19 AFFECT YOU, YOUR FAMILY, YOUR SCHOOL, AND YOUR **RELATIONSHIPS?** That was a lot, but we were pleasantly surprised at the level of engagement and the quality of the writing the subject stimulated. We heard over and over from faculty and administration how engaged the kids were and how much thought and effort they put into these writing assignments. Kiwanis got kudos for inviting the kids to work through some of their feelings and experiences. In one school, the paper was so good that the Assistant Principal copied it and distributed it to all teachers.

We can't read all the papers, but I am sharing some of the lines that we thought made this year exceptional. The kids obviously went through far more than even we were hearing about on news broadcasts. And it changed who they were. But the surprise to us was that they came through COVID with hope and determination. They caught the light at the end of the tunnel, as we were all still complaining about how dark the tunnel was. Our kids are resilient, and they have shown it in our post-COVID interactions with them and the comments they incorporated in their Silver Pen assignments.

Note these excerpts from the kids:

"Wearing a mask was a tremendous change for me, because when I wear a mask, I get sores on my nose and those really hurt."

"The aggressive protests during COVID made me scared that things were really getting out of control. This added to my levels of concern with my mental health and increased my fear, anxiety, and depression."

"I was not allowed to see friends or even family members that lived out of state. My Grandma got real sick and died and none of the family was allowed to be with her. I was so lonely being isolated from family and friends. I can't imagine how lonely that was for her."

"I had countless times of pain, suffering, struggles, trouble, and sorrow. I could not eat. It was hard to get through the day."

"COVID ruined a lot of stuff for me, my family, my friends, and my school. COVID was an awful virus. No one liked it, and I hope it never returns."

"The skills I learned in the middle of the pandemic were a much-needed boost to my outdated self. Tons of computer programs gave me the skills I have today."

"I decided it was not the end, so I didn't give up. I pressed on, even through times of mass pain. It was my only hope. I decided to make a comeback - to strike from the shadows, and to truly press on. I eventually came out victorious and was able to get back to living my life."

"COVID 19 has made an enormous impact on my everyday life because

I would not be who I am today, and would not know what it would feel like to have something crazy be going on like this. I am so glad that my family and I were okay."

These are all quotes from winning papers in each school. Our kids hurt deeply, but they bounced back, too, not to where they were but to a new way of doing life. From what we heard, most of them are doing that fairly well, perhaps better than we are. Until next year, thanks for your help!

On April 2nd, 2022 members of the Kiwanis Club of Marietta Golden K toured the, "state of the art" MUST Ministries HOPE HOUSE. Kiwanis members Jim Perry, Rosie Teague and John Kone joined alongside other visitors as they toured the 16 million dollar Hope House. Kaye Cagle, VP of Marketing & PR added, "The shelter was \$16 million of the consolidated campus expense of \$23 million. We are now remodeling the Marietta Client Services and Headquarters building next door to the shelter and some funds went toward paying off the Donation Center behind the shelter". MGK members are regular "food donation" contributors to MUST Ministries and on the 1st Thursday of each month, MGK members bring in their food donations. After the meeting, members take the food sacks out to the parking lot where they are loaded into the trunk of Rosie Teague (Vice President of MGK and MUST Ministries designated chairperson). Then, Rosie takes the food over to MUST Ministries.

The long awaited HOPE HOUSE Katy Ruth Camp, Director of Marketing & PR, MUST Ministries says it best as she points out the highlights of MUST Ministries' pioneering new shelter, MUST HOPE HOUSE:

- 43,556 square feet and two stories
- 136 beds and 36 respite beds for inclement weather
- A chapel, where clients can pray and have a moment of reflection
- Dining hall features picture windows to help alleviate claustrophobia
- A rooftop retreat for families features play areas, tables and seating
- The playground area allows our youngest casualties of poverty to play during their time at the MUST Hope House
- Clients with minor medical needs can be seen by medical professionals in one the three examination rooms
- Those in need of clothing can "shop" at an onsite clothing

boutique.

- 10 Family Rooms with 5 beds and a private bath in each allows families to stay together.
- The Children's Afterschool Learning Center allows children to read, study, do homework and work with tutors.
- Workforce development offers clients private rooms to make phone calls and work on resumes and job applications.
- A computer lab houses 10 work stations and a "jobs" professional.

Other amenities include:

- Two classrooms
- Staff Offices
- Laundry rooms
- Outreach showers and restrooms
- Staff and volunteer breakrooms
- Meeting/conference roomsStaff workrooms

For the past 33 years, MUST has given thousands of families shelter in the Elizabeth Inn in Marietta. But we wanted to do more, help more, and have a place for those families that was built with their needs at the forefront. The purpose of the STAR program is threefold: * to recognize academic achievement in Georgia's high schools and to motivate students to be good scholars and high achievers * to honor excellence in teaching, to promote teaching as a career and to encourage outstanding teachers to remain in the classroom * to demonstrate the business community's commitment to excellence in education and to increase interaction between students and the business community. To qualify to be a STAR student, you must: 1. Be a Senior 2. Take the three-part or two-part SAT any year on any national testing date 3. Score the highest on a single test date 4. At the end of your junior year, be in the top 10 percent (or be among the top 10 students numerically - whichever category provides the largest number of eligible students).
